

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# **Getting Started**

# Mounting and Powering the Device in Your Vehicle


#### **WARNING**

This product contains a lithium-ion battery. To prevent the possibility of personal injury or product damage caused by battery exposure to extreme heat, store the device out of direct sunlight.

Both the device and its mount contain magnets. Under certain circumstances, magnets may cause interference with some internal medical devices and electronic devices, including pacemakers, insulin pumps, or hard drives in laptop computers. Keep the device away from medical devices and electronic devices.

Before you use your device on battery power, you should charge it.

1 Open the lever ①, press the suction cup to the windshield, and flip the lever back toward the windshield. The lever must be oriented toward the top of the windshield.



- 2 Tighten the knob ② slightly.
- 3 If necessary, adjust the mount for better viewing and operation.
- 4 Tighten the knob to secure the mount.
- 5 Connect the vehicle power cable 3 to the cable 4 on the mount.



- **6** Tighten the collar around the connected power cables.
- 7 Plug the other end of the vehicle power cable into a power outlet in your vehicle.


8 Place the device onto the magnetic mount.



9 Push down the lock (5) to secure the device to the mount.

# **Turning the Device On or Off**

• To turn the device on, press the power key ①, or connect the device to power.



- To put the device in power saving mode, press the power key while the device is on.
   While in power saving mode, the screen is off and the device uses very little power, but it can wake instantly for use.
  - **TIP:** You can charge your device faster by putting it in power saving mode while charging the battery.
- To turn off the device completely, hold the power key until a prompt appears on the screen, and select **Power off**.

# **Acquiring GPS Signals**

When you turn on your navigation device, the GPS receiver must collect satellite data and establish the current location. The time required to acquire satellite signals varies based on several factors, including how far you are from the location where you last used your navigation device, whether you have a clear view of the sky, and how long it has been since you last used your navigation device. The first time you turn on your navigation device, it may take several minutes to acquire satellite signals.

- 1 Turn on the device.
- 2 Verify ♥ appears in the status bar, and enable location services if it does not (*Enabling or Disabling Location Services*, page 56).
- 3 If necessary, go to an open area with a clear view of the sky, away from tall buildings and trees.
  - appears at the top of the navigation map until the device determines your location.

#### **Status Bar Icons**

The status bar is located at the top of the main menu. The status bar icons display information about features on the device. You can select some icons to change settings or view additional information.

# **Using the Touchscreen**

- · Tap the screen to select an item.
- · Drag or swipe your finger across the screen to pan or scroll.
- · Pinch two fingers together to zoom out.
- · Spread two fingers apart to zoom in.

# **Using the On-Screen Buttons**

On-screen buttons allow you to navigate the pages, menus, and menu options on your device.

- Select ★ or ➤ to scroll through lists or menus.
- Hold ★ or ➤ to scroll faster.
- Select = to see a context-based menu of options for the current screen.

# **Adjusting the Screen Brightness**

You can adjust the brightness manually, using either the notification panel or the settings menu.

- 1 Select an option:
  - Swipe down twice from the top of the screen to expand the guick settings in the notification panel.
  - Select 🗘 > Device > Display > Brightness level.
- 2 Use the slider bar to adjust the brightness.

#### **Vehicle Profiles**

Entering your vehicle profile characteristics does not guarantee that your vehicle's characteristics will be accounted for in all route suggestions. Limitations may exist in map data for some route suggestions. Always defer to all posted road signs and conditions during vehicle operation. Failure to do so could lead to an accident involving personal injury or death.

Vehicle profiles allow you to choose different settings based on each vehicle you use with the device. The current vehicle profile is indicated by an icon in the status bar. If your vehicle profile includes a trailer, an icon of the trailer appears with the vehicle icon.

#### Adding a Vehicle Profile

You can add a vehicle profile for each vehicle to be used with your device.

- 1 Select > Navigation > Vehicle Profile > +.
- 2 Select your current vehicle.
- 3 Follow the on-screen instructions to enter the vehicle characteristics.

#### **Choosing a Vehicle Profile**

- 1 Swipe down twice from the top of the screen.
- 2 Select the vehicle profile icon on the status bar.

## **Adding Propane Tanks**

**NOTE:** This feature is not available on all product models.

When you add your propane tanks to your vehicle profile, the device avoids routing through areas with propane tank restrictions that may affect your route. The device also alerts you when you approach areas that require you to shut off your propane tanks.

- 1 From the vehicle profile, select > Add Tank.
- 2 Enter the weight of the propane tank, and select Save.

#### **Editing a Vehicle Profile**

You can change basic vehicle profile information or add detailed information to a vehicle profile, such as maximum speed.

- 1 Select > Navigation > Vehicle Profile.
- 2 Select the vehicle profile to edit.
- 3 Select an option:
  - To edit the vehicle profile information, select \( \frac{1}{3} \), and select a field to edit.
  - To rename the vehicle profile, select > = > Rename Profile.
  - To delete the vehicle profile, select

# **Off-Road Navigation Features**

#### **Routes**

A route is a path from your current location to one or more destinations.

- For off-road use, you can set the device to calculate point-to-point routes in a straight line (Straight Line Routes, page 8).
- The device calculates a recommended route to your destination based on the preferences you set, including the route calculation mode (*Changing the Route Calculation Mode*, page 43) and avoidances (*Avoiding Delays, Tolls, and Areas*, page 41).
- The device can automatically avoid roads that are not appropriate for the active vehicle profile.
- You can start navigating to your destination quickly using the recommended route, or you can select an alternate route (*Starting a Route*, page 38).
- If there are specific roads you need to use or avoid, you can customize the route (*Shaping Your Route*, page 41).
- You can add multiple destinations to a route (Adding a Location to Your Route, page 41).

#### **Adventure Roads and Trails**

Entering your vehicle profile characteristics does not guarantee that your vehicle's characteristics will be accounted for in all route suggestions. Limitations may exist in map data for some route suggestions. Always defer to all posted road signs and conditions during vehicle operation. Failure to do so could lead to an accident involving personal injury or death.

This device can navigate off-highway roads and trails based on your vehicle profile. Trails ① are color coded based on accessibility. You can select set to set which adventure roads and trails appear on the map.



# **Straight Line Routes**

For areas without defined roads or trails, the device guides you to your destination using a straight line route. You can set multiple waypoints to navigate a route through areas without roads.



- 1 Distance to the destination.
- (2) Route highlighted on the map.
- (3) Vehicle speed.
- (4) Map tools. Provides tools to show you more information about your route and surroundings.
- Map layers. Allows you to change the map orientation and add topographic and BirdsEye imagery to your map view.

#### **Skipping the Next Stop on Your Route**

You can skip an upcoming location you previously added to your route.

From the map, select > Yes.

## **Stopping the Route**

From the map, select = > Stop.

#### **Tracks**

A track is a recording of your path. The track log contains information about the recorded path, including time, location, and elevation information.

#### **Recording Tracks**

Tracking records your path. When you start tracking, your device logs your location and updates the track line. If your device is paired with a Garmin Explore™ account, your device periodically synchronizes recorded tracks with the app.

- 1 From the main menu, swipe to the left and select Track Recorder.
- 2 Select Start.

#### **Navigating a Track**

You can navigate a saved track using the Garmin Explore app on your device.

- 1 Select -> Adventure > Explore > Tracks.
- 2 Select a track.
- 3 Select Go!.

#### Viewing Your Collections on the Map

Before you can view the Collections map layer, you must pair your device with the Tread app and sync your device with your Garmin Explore account.

You can view your Garmin Explore collections directly on the map. You must enable the collections map layer to use this feature.

**NOTE:** If you do not assign a collection category to your Garmin Explore data, it appears as an unorganized collection.

- 1 Select View Map > \$\infty\$ > Collections.
- 2 Select one or more collection categories from the list.
- 3 Select Save.

Your collections appear as icons on the map.

## Pitch and Roll

#### **△ WARNING**

The Pitch and Roll application is intended to show vehicle angles based on calibrated measurements only. You are responsible for calibrating the device. Changes to the position of the device after calibration may affect the accuracy of its measurements. Measured values are suggestions only based on your input into the device. Take readings often and carefully, and allow the readings to stabilize after significant changes in environmental conditions. Always allow a margin of safety for changing conditions and reading errors. Failure to account for your vehicle and your environment could cause an incident resulting in death or serious injury.

The device alerts you if your vehicle pitches or rolls at an angle that could affect the vehicle's stability.

#### **Calibrating Pitch and Roll**

You can set the angle of your vehicle to zero at any time.

- 1 Park your vehicle on a flat, level surface.
- 2 Adjust the position of your device in the mount so you can comfortably view the screen.
- 3 From the main menu, swipe to the left and select Pitch and Roll > Calibrate.

The values for pitch and roll reset to 0 degrees.

#### *∧* WARNING

To maintain the best accuracy, you must calibrate pitch and roll each time you reposition your device.

#### **Adjusting Warning Angles**

You can adjust the angles at which the device activates a pitch or roll alert. You are responsible for knowing and setting the correct pitch and roll angle for your vehicle.

- 1 From the main menu, swipe to the left and select Pitch and Roll > : > Warning Angles.
- 2 Swipe up or down to adjust the pitch or roll warning angles.
- 3 Select Accept.

#### **Enabling or Disabling Warning Angle Alerts**

- 1 From the main menu, swipe to the left and select Pitch and Roll > :.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To enable or disable pitch and roll notifications, select Pitch and Roll Notifications.
  - To enable or disable audible alerts, select Audible Alerts.

# Viewing the Altimeter, Barometer, and Compass

The device contains internal altimeter, barometer, and compass sensors with automatic calibration.

Select > Adventure > ABC.

**TIP:** You can also select the Altimeter or Barometer widget to open the ABC app.

## **Calibrating the Compass**

#### **NOTICE**

Calibrate the electronic compass outdoors. To improve heading accuracy, do not stand near metal objects or objects that influence magnetic fields, such as vehicles, electronic devices, buildings, or overhead power lines.

When your device is connected to the mount, it uses GPS data to determine your compass heading. When you remove the device from the mount, it uses a built-in compass to show your heading.

Each time you disconnect your device from the mount, the device prompts you to calibrate the compass.

If you experience irregular compass behavior, for example, after moving long distances or after extreme temperature changes, you can manually calibrate the compass to improve accuracy.

- 1 Disconnect the device from the mount and move away from objects that influence magnetic fields.
- 2 From the main menu, swipe to the left and select Altimeter > : > Calibrate Compass.
- 3 Follow the on-screen instructions.

# **Group Ride**

The Group Ride app allows you to coordinate rides and communicate with nearby riders using preset text messages, live map locations, and voice communications.

**NOTE:** Before you can use the Group Ride app, you must install a Group Ride accessory. Go to garmin.com to purchase a Group Ride accessory.

#### Starting a Group Ride

You can create a group ride that allows you to choose the group radio channel, view and remove riders who join your group ride, and set the group ride name.

**NOTE:** For some product models, the Group Ride app is located in the apps menu.

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride > Start a Group Ride.
- 2 Enter your rider name, and select Done.
- 3 If necessary, select the radio channel, and select Next.
- 4 Enter the ride name, and select **Done**.
  - As riders join your group ride, their names appear on the list.
- 5 Select Start.

The group ride begins after all riders sync with the group ride.

#### Joining a Group Ride

You can join a nearby group ride that was created by another rider.

**NOTE:** For some product models, the Group Ride app is located in the apps menu.

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride > Nearby Group Rides.
- 2 Select a nearby group ride, and select Join.

# Rejoining a Recent Group Ride

You can rejoin any of your ten most-recent group rides.

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride > Recent Group Rides.
- 2 Select a recent group ride, and select Join.

#### Adding Riders to a Group Ride

You can add riders to a group ride that is already in progress.

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride.
- 3 Select Add.

As new riders join the group ride, they appear on the list.

4 Select Continue.

#### **Broadcasting a Message**

#### **↑** WARNING

Do not read, send, or reply to any messages while driving. If you do so, you could become distracted by the display, which could lead to an accident causing personal injury or death.

You can broadcast a preset message to the members in your active group ride that are in range of the VHF radio.

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride.
- 2 If necessary, select .
- 3 Select Broadcast to Group.
- 4 Select a preset message, and select Send.

#### **Broadcasting a Location**

#### **⚠ WARNING**

While driving, do not interact with the display to broadcast your location. If you do so, you could become distracted by the display, which could lead to an accident causing serious personal injury or death.

You can broadcast a location to the members in your active group ride that are in range of the VHF radio.

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride.
- 2 If necessary, select ...
- 3 Select Broadcast to Group > Broadcast a Location, and select a location.
- 4 Select Share.

#### **Viewing a Group Ride Notification**

#### **⚠ WARNING**

Do not read or reply to any notifications while driving. If you do so, you could become distracted by the display, which could lead to an accident causing serious personal injury or death.

From most pages, a notification appears when the device receives a broadcasted group ride location or message. You can also view group ride notifications in the Group Ride app.

NOTE: When you are viewing the map, new notifications appear in a map tool at the edge of the screen..

- 1 From the main menu, select **Group Ride** > , and select a notification.
- 2 Select Go! to navigate to a shared location.

## **Exiting a Group Ride**

- 1 From the main menu, select Group Ride.
- 3 Select Exit > Yes.

#### **Group Ride Settings**

From the main menu, select **Group Ride** >**\( \)**.

**Edit Rider Name**: Allows you to set your name that displays during a group ride. This setting is not available during an active group ride.

Rider Map Labels: Sets the label to be displayed on each active rider on the map.

Show Tracks on Map: Shows the track that each group ride member takes on the map.

Auto Zoom to Group: Enables the map to automatically zoom to the active group ride.

**Reset Default Settings**: Allows you to reset all group ride settings to default values. This setting is not available during an active group ride.

#### Radio

NOTE: This feature is not available on all product models.

**NOTE:** Before you can use the Radio app, you must install a Group Ride accessory. Go to garmin.com to purchase a Group Ride accessory.

You can use the Radio app to create radio presets, select a radio channel, and select squelch codes. To use this feature, you must connect the device and the antenna to the Group Ride mount. The Tread - Overland Edition device configures radio settings automatically when you join or create a group ride.

#### Selecting a Preset

**NOTE:** For some product models, the Radio app is located in the apps menu.

- 1 From the main menu, select Radio.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To move through available presets, select ▲ or ▼.
  - · To select a preset from the menu, select Preset.

#### Selecting a Radio Channel

- 1 From the main menu, select Radio.
- 2 Select an option:

  - · To select a MURS channel from the menu, select Channel.

#### Adjusting the Squelch

You can adjust the squelch and change between CTCSS, DCS, and Open squelch modes to improve audio quality and avoid radio interference in your area.

- 1 From the main menu, select Radio.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To choose a squelch code within the current mode, select + or -.
  - · To adjust the squelch mode, select **Open**.

#### **Adding a Custom Radio Preset**

- 1 Select Radio > Preset > (+).
- 2 Select  $\blacksquare$  or  $\blacksquare$  to select a channel and squelch code.
- 3 Select Save.

## Selecting a Roger Tone

You can select the tone other devices play when you operate your radio.

- 1 Select Radio > 4 > Roger Tone.
- 2 Select a roger tone.

The device plays the selected tone.

3 Select Save.

#### **Turning the Radio Off**

Select Radio > U > Yes.

# **Enabling Push-to-Talk with a Headset**

You can enable push-to-talk controls for use with a compatible Bluetooth headset. This allows you to transmit your voice using the voice dial feature on your headset.

- 1 Select Radio > > Push to Talk with Headset.
- 2 If necessary, follow the on-screen instructions to pair your headset with the device.
- 3 Select Push to Talk with Headset.
- 4 Select ✓.

#### **Transmitting Your Voice**

Before you can transmit your voice, you must pair your Tread - Overland Edition device with a compatible Bluetooth headset or connect the fist microphone.

You can transmit your voice over the radio using the connected fist microphone or a compatible Bluetooth headset.

**NOTE:** For some product models, the Radio app is located in the apps menu.

Select an option:

- · Hold the push-to-talk button on the side of the connected fist microphone.
- From the main menu, select Radio > Push to Talk .
- Use the voice dial feature on your connected Bluetooth headset (*Enabling Push-to-Talk with a Headset*, page 13).

**TIP:** You can press the pause or stop button to manually close the radio.

**NOTE**: You must enable the **Push to Talk with Headset** setting to use this feature (*Radio Settings*, page 14).

# **Adjusting the Radio Volume**

- 1 Select Radio > ))).
- 2 Use the slider bars to adjust the volume.

#### **Radio Settings**

From the main menu, select Radio > 4.

**Push to Talk with Headset**: Enables you to transmit your voice using the push-to-talk button on your compatible headset.

**Roger Tone**: Sets the roger tone the device plays when you operate your radio.

Reset Default Settings: Resets all radio settings and presets to factory default values.

# inReach® Features

#### **↑** WARNING

Messaging, tracking, and SOS functions require an active satellite subscription. Always test your device before you use it outdoors.

Ensure you have a clear view of the sky when using the messaging, tracking, and SOS functions, because these features require satellite access to operate properly.

#### NOTICE

Some jurisdictions regulate or prohibit the use of satellite communications devices. It is the responsibility of the user to know and follow all applicable laws in the jurisdictions where the device is intended to be used.

To get the most out of your device, you should activate it. Activating the device allows you to use inReach features, including messaging, SOS, tracking, and inReach Weather.

# Messages

Your Tread - Overland Edition device sends and receives text messages using the Iridium satellite network. You can send messages to an SMS phone number, an email address, or another device that uses inReach technology. Each message you send includes your location details where allowed.

## Sending a Preset inReach Message

Preset messages have predefined text and predetermined recipients. You must set up preset messages using the Garmin Explore website at explore.garmin.com.

- 1 Select inReach > Presets.
- 2 Select a preset message, and select Send.

## Sending a Text Message

- 1 Select inReach > Compose.
- 2 Select To:, and add one or more contacts.
- 3 Select **Message:**, and enter a message.
- 4 Select Send.

#### Replying to a Message

- 1 Select inReach.
- 2 Select a conversation, and select Reply.
- 3 Select an option:
  - To start with a pre-written message, select a quick text message from the top of the screen.
    - NOTE: You can add and edit quick text messages on the Garmin Explore website.
  - To write a custom message, enter a message.
- 4 Select Done.

#### **Checking for Messages**

When you send a message, your device listens for replies for 10 minutes. The device also checks for new messages every hour. When you are using the inReach tracking feature, your device automatically checks for messages at your tracking interval.

**NOTE**: To receive messages, your device must have a clear view of the sky and be in view of a satellite when it checks for the messages.

You can force a check for messages by manually checking for messages, sending a message, or sending a track point. During a check, your device connects to satellites and receives messages waiting to be sent to your device.

Select inReach > Check.

#### **Navigating to a Message Location**

When you send or receive a message from another device with inReach technology, the message may include location information. For these messages, you can navigate to the location from which the message was sent.

- 1 Select inReach, and select a conversation.
- 2 Select a message with location information, and select Go!.

#### **Deleting a Message**

- 1 Select inReach.
- 2 Select a conversation.
- 3 Select Delete > Yes

# inReach Tracking

You can use the tracking feature on your Tread - Overland Edition device to record track points and transmit them over the Iridium satellite network at the specified send interval. Track points appear on the Garmin Explore website and the MapShare tracking page.

#### **Starting Tracking**

Select inReach >

## **Stopping Tracking**

Select inReach > 0.

**NOTE:** Stopping tracking also pauses your activity recording.

#### **Sharing Your MapShare Web Page**

You can enable MapShare at explore.garmin.com.

You can share a link to your MapShare webpage with other people. The system automatically adds text, including link information, to the end of your message.

- 1 Select inReach > > Send MapShare.
- 2 Select To:, and add one or more contacts.
- 3 Select Message:, and enter a message.
- 4 Select Send.

#### inReach Tracking Settings

Select inReach > [3]

**Tracking Sync:** Sets the device to use the track recorder and inReach tracking simultaneously.

**Auto Track**: Sets the device to start tracking when you turn on the device.

**Send Interval**: Sets the frequency at which the device records a track point and transmits it over the satellite network when you are moving. If you are on a professional plan, you can specify the interval when you are stationary.

#### SOS

During an emergency, you can use your Tread - Overland Edition device to contact the Garmin® International Emergency Response Coordination Center (IERCC) to request help. Pressing the SOS button sends a message to the Garmin IERCC, and they notify the appropriate emergency responders of your situation. You can communicate with the Garmin IERCC during your emergency while you wait for help to arrive. You should only use the SOS function in a real emergency situation.

#### **Initiating an SOS Rescue**

#### **↑** CAUTION

While the device is in SOS mode, do not turn off or attempt to turn off the device. Doing so could prevent this feature from operating properly and could delay receipt of assistance in the event of an emergency.

1 Open the SOS door on the device 1.



- 2 Press the SOS button 2.
- 3 Wait for the SOS countdown.

The device sends a default message to the emergency response service with details about your location.

- **4** Reply to the confirmation message from the emergency response service.
  - Your reply lets the emergency response service know that you are capable of interacting with them during the rescue.

For the first 10 minutes of your rescue, an updated location is sent to the emergency response service every minute. To conserve battery power after the first 10 minutes, an updated location is sent every 10 minutes when moving, and every 30 minutes when stationary.

#### Canceling an SOS Rescue

If you no longer need assistance, you can cancel an SOS rescue after it is sent to the emergency response service.

#### Select Cancel SOS.

Your device transmits the cancellation request. When you receive a confirmation message from the emergency response service, the device returns to normal operation.

# Syncing inReach Data

You can sync data from your explore.garmin.com account to your device using the Garmin Explore app. After you make edits to your data, such as plan changes, contacts, preset messages, or quick text messages, you must sync them to your device using the mobile app.

Open the Garmin Explore app.

Changes made to data such as collections, waypoints, routes, and tracks update automatically.

You can now sync your data to your Tread - Overland Edition device.

#### Contacts

You can add, delete, and edit contacts on the Tread - Overland Edition device.

#### **Adding a Contact**

- 1 Select inReach > \( \struct > \) inReach Contacts > New Contact.
- **2** Enter the new information.
- 3 Select Save.

# **Editing a Contact**

- Select a contact.
- 3 Select an item to edit.
- **4** Enter the new information.
- 5 Select Save.

#### **Deleting a Contact**

- 1 Select inReach > > inReach Contacts.
- 2 Select a contact.
- 3 Select m > Yes.

You can view plan details and data use on the Tread - Overland Edition device.

# Viewing Plan and Usage Details

Select inReach > 4 > About This Device.

# Using the Map

You can use the map to navigate a route (Your Route on the Map, page 39) or to view a map of your surroundings when no route is active.

- 1 Select View Map.
- 2 Touch anywhere on the map.
- 3 Select an option:
  - Drag the map to pan left, right, up, or down.
  - To add or remove map layers such as topographic and BirdsEye imagery, select .

  - To switch between North Up, 2-D, and 3-D views, select ▲.
  - To open the route planner, select \(\frac{1}{2}\) (Route Planner, page 24).
  - To start a route, select a location on the map, and select **Go!** (Starting a Route by Using the Map, page 38).

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## **Map Tools**

Map tools provide quick access to information and device functions while you view the map. When you activate a map tool, it appears in a panel at the edge of the map.

**Stop**: Stops navigation of the active route.

Edit Route: Allows you to take a detour or skip locations in your route (Changing Your Active Route, page 41).

Mute: Mutes the device audio.

**Cities Ahead**: Shows upcoming cities and services along your active route or along a highway (*Cities Ahead*, page 19).

**Up Ahead**: Shows upcoming locations along the route or the road on which you are traveling (*Up Ahead*, page 18).

Elevation: Displays elevation changes ahead.

**Traffic**: Displays traffic conditions along your route or in your area (*Viewing Upcoming Traffic*, page 20). This feature is not available in all areas or for all device models.

**Trip Data**: Displays customizable trip data, such as speed or mileage (*Viewing Trip Data from the Map*, page 19).

Track Recorder: Displays the track data for your active route.

**Turns**: Displays a list of upcoming turns in your route (*Viewing Turns and Directions*, page 40).

**Phone**: Displays a list of recent phone calls from your connected phone, and displays in-call options while a phone call is active (*Using In-Call Options*, page 37).

**Weather**: Displays weather conditions for your area.

Music Player: Displays media controls and media information.

**Smart Notifications**: Displays recent smart notifications from your connected phone.

**Pitch and Roll**: Displays the current angle of your vehicle (*Pitch and Roll*, page 9).

Group Ride: Displays the distance and direction of the members in your group ride (Group Ride, page 10).

**Environmental Zones**: Shows upcoming environmental zones that apply to your vehicle.

**inReach**: Allows you to view and send inReach messages, and start inReach tracking (*inReach*® *Features*, page 14).

#### Viewing a Map Tool

- 1 From the map, select
- 2 Select a map tool.

The map tool appears in a panel at the edge of the map.

3 When you are done using the map tool, select X.

# **Up Ahead**

The Up Ahead tool provides information about upcoming locations along your route or the road on which you are traveling. You can view upcoming points of interest by category, such as restaurants, fuel stations, or rest areas.

You can customize the categories that show in the Up Ahead tool.

#### **Viewing Upcoming Locations**

1 From the map, select = > Up Ahead.

While you are traveling, the map tool shows the next location along your road or route.

- 2 Select an option:
  - · If the map tool shows categories, select a category to view a list of nearby locations in that category.
  - If the map tool shows upcoming locations, select a location to view location details or start a route to the location.

#### **Customizing the Up Ahead Categories**

You can change the location categories that appear in the Up Ahead tool.

- 1 From the map, select = > Up Ahead.
- 2 Select a category.
- 3 Select 4.
- 4 Select an option:
  - To move a category up or down in the list, select and drag the arrow next to the category name.
  - · To change a category, select the category.
  - To create a custom category, select a category, select Custom Search, and enter the name of a business or category.
- 5 Select Save.

#### **Cities Ahead**

While you are traveling on a highway or navigating a route that includes a highway, the Cities Ahead tool provides information about upcoming cities along the highway. For each city, the map tool shows the distance to the highway exit and the services available, similar to the information on highway road signs.

## **Viewing Upcoming Cities and Exit Services**

1 From the map, select = > Cities Ahead.

While you are traveling along a highway or an active route, the map tool shows information about upcoming cities and exits.

2 Select a city.

The device shows a list of points of interest located at the selected city exit, such as fuel stations, lodging, or restaurants.

3 Select a location, and select **Go!** to start navigating.

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# **Viewing Upcoming Elevation Changes**

You can view upcoming elevation changes along your route. This can help you avoid or plan for steep uphill or downhill grades.

- 1 From the map, select = > Elevation.
- 2 Select the chart to expand it to the full screen.

The device displays your current elevation, and a chart of elevation over distance.

- 3 Select an option:
  - Select + or to change the distance range of the chart.
  - · Select the arrows to scroll the chart.

# **Viewing Upcoming Traffic**

#### **NOTICE**

Garmin is not responsible for the accuracy or timeliness of the traffic information.

Before you can use this feature, your device must be receiving traffic data (Traffic, page 44).

You can view traffic incidents coming up along your route or along the road on which you are traveling.

- 1 While navigating a route, select **> Traffic**.

  The nearest upcoming traffic incident appears in a panel on the right side of the map.
- 2 Select the traffic incident to view additional details.

#### Viewing Traffic on the Map

The traffic map shows color-coded traffic flow and delays on nearby roads.

- 1 From the main menu, select -> Navigation > Traffic.
- 2 If necessary, select = > **Legend** to view the legend for the traffic map.

## **Searching for Traffic Incidents**

- 1 From the main menu, select -> Navigation > Traffic.
- 2 Select = > Incidents.
- 3 Select an item in the list.
- 4 If there is more than one incident, use the arrows to view additional incidents.

# **Customizing the Map Layers**

You can customize which data appear on the map, such as icons for points of interest and road conditions.

- 2 Select the layers to include on the map, and select **Save**.

#### Viewing the Public Lands Map Key

Public lands are color-coded on the map to show who owns a specific plot of land. For example, you can see if a plot of land is privately owned or if it is part of a national park. You must enable the public lands map layer to use this feature (*Customizing the Map Layers*, page 20).

You can view the legend for these colors on the device.

Select ★ > Map Display > Map Layers > 1 > Public Lands.

#### **Enabling Adventure Roads and Trails Map Layers**

You can enable or disable map layers that display accessible or inaccessible roads for different types of motor vehicles.

- 2 Select a road or trail type.

#### Changing the Map Data Field

- 1 From the map, select a data field.
  - NOTE: You cannot customize Speed.
- 2 Select a type of data to display.

#### **Changing the Map Buttons**

- 1 From the map, hold a map button.
- 2 Select an option:
  - · To replace a map button, select a map button, and select a map button to display.
  - To remove a map button, select in.
- 3 Select Save

#### **Changing the Map Perspective**

- 1 Select 🗘 > Map Display > Driving Map View.
- 2 Select an option:
  - Select **Track Up** to display the map in two dimensions (2-D), with your direction of travel at the top.
  - Select **North Up** to display the map in 2-D with north at the top.
  - · Select **3-D** to display the map in three dimensions.
  - Select Auto Zoom to Group to automatically adjust the zoom level so all riders in a group ride are visible on the map.
- 3 Select Save.

# **Dog Tracking**

The dog tracking features allow you to see information transmitted from your compatible Garmin handheld dog device on your Tread - Overland Edition device. You can navigate to your dogs, view their current status and location, and observe the distance they have traveled.

# **Receiving Data From Your Handheld Device**

Before you can receive data, you must enable broadcasting on your handheld dog device. See the owner's manual for your handheld dog device for more information.

Place your handheld dog device within 3 m (10 ft) of your Tread - Overland Edition device.

**TIP:** Your Tread - Overland Edition device receives data from one compatible handheld dog device at a time. Stay more than 3 m (10 ft) away from other handheld dog devices or disable broadcasting on handheld dog devices from which you do not want to receive data.

The devices connect and synchronize automatically.

The dogs connected to your handheld dog device appear on the screen.

# **Music Player**

The media player allows your device to control the media currently playing from a media app on your paired phone. You can open the media player at any time by selecting **Tools** > **Music** from the main menu.



- 1 Information about the currently playing media, such as title, artist, album, station, or channel.
- Progress through the current media item.
- 3 Playback controls. The controls change based on the service providing the media.
- Select to hide or shrink the media player.

# Adding the Music Player Tool to the Map

The music player map tool enables you to control the music player from your map.

- 2 Select -> Music Player.

  The music player controls appear on the map.

# BirdsEye Imagery

BirdsEye imagery provides downloadable, high-resolution map imagery, including detailed satellite imagery and raster-based topographical maps. You can download BirdsEye Satellite Imagery directly to your device when it is connected to a Wi-Fi network.

#### **Downloading BirdsEve Imagery**

Before you can download BirdsEye imagery directly to your device, you must connect to a wireless network (*Connecting to a Wireless Network*, page 54).

- 1 Select > Adventure > BirdsEye Direct.
- 2 Select <del>■</del>
- 3 Select an option:
  - To download BirdsEye imagery files for a specific location or area, select Location, and select a category.
     NOTE: The location defaults to your current location.
  - · To select an image quality option, select **Detail**.
  - To define the size of the area to be shown in the downloaded imagery files, select **Size**, and enter a distance from the selected location.
  - To select where to save the downloaded imagery, select **Save To**.
- 4 Select Download.
- 5 Enter a name for the downloaded imagery and select **Done**.

#### **Route Planner**

You can use the route planner to create and save a route, which you can navigate later. This can be useful for planning a delivery route, a vacation, or a road trip. You can edit a saved route to further customize it, including reordering locations, adding suggested attractions, and adding shaping points.

You can also use the route planner to edit and save your active route.

#### Planning a Route

A route can include many locations, and it must include at least a starting location and one destination. The starting location is the location from which you plan to start your route. If you start navigating the route from a different location, the device gives you the option to route to your starting location first. For a round trip, the starting location and final destination can be the same.

NOTE: The Turn-by-Turn mode is selected by default.

  - To remove the location, select in.

#### **Changing Routing Options for a Route**

You can customize how the device calculates your route.

- 2 Select a saved route.
- 3 Select ...
- 4 Select an option:
  - To add shaping points to your route, select **Shaping**, and select at least one location.
  - To change the calculation mode for the route, touch a route segment, and select a calculation mode.

#### **Navigating to a Saved Route**

- 4 Select the first location to navigate to, and select OK.

The device calculates a route from your current location to the selected location, and then it guides you to the remaining route destinations in order.

The device shows the current weather conditions and a forecast for the next several days.

2 Select a day.

The detailed forecast for that day appears.

## Viewing Weather Near a Different City

- 1 Select > Navigation > Weather > Current Location.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To view weather for a favorite city, select a city in the list.
  - · To add a favorite city, select **Add City**, and enter a city name.

## Viewing the Weather Radar

Before you can use this feature, your device must be connected to a supported phone running the Tread app (*Pairing with Your Smartphone*, page 34).

- 1 Select > Navigation > Weather Radar.
- 2 Select to animate the radar map.

## **Viewing Weather Alerts**

Before you can use this feature, your device must be connected to a supported phone running the Tread app (*Pairing with Your Smartphone*, page 34).

**NOTE:** This feature is not available in all areas.

While you are traveling with your device, weather alerts may appear on the map. You can also view a map of weather alerts near your current location or near a selected city.

- 1 Select > Navigation > Weather.
- 2 If necessary, select a city.
- 3 Select = > Weather Alerts.

# **Checking Road Conditions**

Before you can use this feature, your device must be connected to a supported phone running the Tread app (*Pairing with Your Smartphone*, page 34).

You can view weather-related road conditions for the roads in your area, on your route, or in another city.



- 13 Select Calculate.
- 14 Select one or more options:
  - Select to view elevation statistics along your route.
  - Select to shape your route.
  - Use the slider to increase or decrease the level of adventure on your route.

- 2 Displays progress through the current media item.
- 3 Displays playback controls. The controls change based on the service providing the media.
- Displays the current audio source. indicates the media is being played by another media app on your phone and sent to the device using a Bluetooth media connection.
- **(5)** Opens the LED controls.
- 6 Opens the app settings menu.
- 7 Opens the volume zone controls.
- 8 Mutes the audio.
- (9) Increases or decreases the volume.

#### **LED Controls**

The LED controls allow you to control the LED lights on your connected Tread 6.5" XS-LED Tower Speakers and optional, addressable LEDs. You can set the color of the LEDs, sync the LEDs to your music or the speed of your vehicle, and display a call sign color during a group ride.

### **Enabling LED Groups**

By default, the controls for LED groups RGB 1 and RGB 2 are enabled. Enabling an LED group allows you to use the LED lighting controls for that group. You can enable the LED group for the Tread 6.5" XS-LED Tower Speakers or any additional speakers or addressable LEDs after you set up and pair them with your Tread Audio Box.

- 2 Select the LED group.

## **Changing the Media Source**

You can change the source from which media is played on your device.

Group Ride Sync: Sets the LED lights to display a call sign color during a group ride.

# **Audio Zone Settings**

**Zone Name**: Sets the name of the zone. **Loud**: Boosts the high and low frequencies.

**Subwoofer Filter**: Sets the low-pass frequency of the subwoofer.

Bass: Sets the relative volume of low-frequency audio.

**Middle**: Sets the relative volume of middle-frequency audio. **Treble**: Sets the relative volume of high-frequency audio.

**Hands-Free calling**: Allows you to place and receive phone calls through the device using your connected Bluetooth headset.

Send locations to device: Allows you to send locations from your smartphone to your navigation device.

- **4** Follow the on-screen instructions to sign in to a Garmin account and complete the pairing and setup process.

The main app dashboard appears. After the devices are paired, they connect automatically when they are turned on and within range.

# **Tips After Pairing the Devices**

- After the initial pairing, the two devices can connect automatically each time you turn them on.
- · When you turn on the device, it tries to connect to the last phone to which it was connected.
- · You might need to set your phone to connect to the device automatically when the device is turned on.
- You should verify the Bluetooth features you want to use are enabled (*Enabling or Disabling Bluetooth Features*, page 37).

## **Pairing Additional Bluetooth Devices**

- 1 Place your headset or phone and your Bluetooth device within 33 ft. (10 m) of each other.
- 2 On your device, enable Bluetooth wireless technology.
- 3 On your headset or phone, enable Bluetooth wireless technology and ensure it is visible to other Bluetooth devices.

  A list of nearby Bluetooth devices appears.
- 5 Select your headset or phone from the list.
- 6 If necessary, select Pair.

### **Smart Notifications**

While your device is connected to the Tread app, you can view notifications from your smartphone on your Tread - Overland Edition device, such as text messages, incoming calls, and calendar appointments.

# **Receiving Notifications**

From most pages, a popup appears when the device receives a notification from your smartphone. If the device is moving, you must verify you are a passenger and not the driver before you can view notifications.

**NOTE:** If you are viewing the map, notifications appear in a map tool.

- · To ignore a notification, select **OK**.
  - The popup closes, but the notification remains active on your phone.
- · To view a notification, select View.
- · To listen to the notification, select View > Play.
  - The device reads the notification using text-to-speech technology. This feature is not available for all languages.
- To perform additional actions, such as dismissing the notification from your phone, select View, and select an option.

**NOTE:** Additional actions are available for only some notification types and must be supported by the app generating the notification.

### Receiving Notifications while Viewing the Map

Before you can use this feature, your device must be connected to a supported phone running the Tread app (*Pairing with Your Smartphone*, page 34).

When you are viewing the map, new notifications appear in a map tool at the edge of the screen. If the device is moving, you must verify you are a passenger and not the driver before you can view notifications.

- To ignore a notification, select X, or wait for popup to expire.
   The popup closes, but the notification remains active on your phone.
- · To view a notification, select the notification text.
- · To listen to the notification, select Play Message.

The device reads the notification using text-to-speech technology. This feature is not available for all languages.

## **Viewing the List of Notifications**

You can view a list of all active notifications.

1 Select > Navigation > Smart Notifications.

The list of notifications appears. Unread notifications appear black, and previously read notifications appear gray.

- 2 Select an option:
  - · To view a notification, select the notification description.
  - To listen to a notification, select .

The device reads the notification using text-to-speech technology. This feature is not available for all languages.

# Hands-Free Calling

**NOTE:** While most phones and headsets are supported and can be used, a particular phone or headset cannot be guaranteed to be compatible. All features may not be available for your phone.

Using Bluetooth wireless technology, your device can connect to your compatible mobile phone and wireless headset or helmet to become a hands-free device. To check compatibility, go to www.garmin.com/bluetooth.

# Placing a Call

- 1 Select > Tools > Phone.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To dial a number, select \( \frac{\text{line}}{2} \), enter the phone number, and select \( \lambda \).
  - To view numbers of recent, missed, or recently dialed or received calls, select ①, select a log, and select a number to dial it.
  - To call a contact from your phone book, select 
     and select a contact.

## **Using In-Call Options**

In-call options appear when you answer a call. Some options may not be compatible with your phone.

TIP: If you close the in-call options page, you can open it again by selecting \( \screen \) from any screen.

- To set up a conference call, select Add Call.
- · To transfer audio to your phone, select Call in Progress on Navigator.

**TIP:** You can use this feature if you want to disconnect the Bluetooth connection and remain on the call, or if you need privacy.

· To use the dial pad, select **Keypad**.

**TIP:** You can use this feature to use automated systems, such as voice mail.

- · To mute the microphone, select Mute.
- · To hang up, select End Call.

## Saving a Phone Number as a Preset

You can save up to three contacts as presets on the dial pad. This allows you to quickly call your home phone number, family members, or frequently called contacts.

- 1 Select > Tools > Phone.
- 2 If necessary, select
- 3 Select a preset number, such as Preset 1.
- 4 Select OK. then select a contact.

# **Enabling or Disabling Bluetooth Features**

You can enable or disable Bluetooth features such as phone calls, media audio, and live services for your paired smartphone.

- 1 Select 🗘 > Wireless Networks > Bluetooth.
- 2 Select your phone name.
- 3 Select a feature to enable or disable it.

# Showing or Hiding App Notifications (Android<sup>™</sup>)

You can use the Tread app to customize which types of smartphone notifications appear on your Tread - Overland Edition device.

- 1 On your phone, open the Tread app.
- 2 Select > Smart Notifications.

A list of smartphone app categories appears.

3 Select a category to enable or disable notifications for that type of app.

# Showing or Hiding Notification Categories for Your Apple Device

If you are connected to an Apple device, you can filter the notifications shown on your Tread - Overland Edition device by showing or hiding categories.

- 1 Select -> Navigation > Smart Notifications > 4.
- 2 Select the check box next to each notification to show.

# **Enabling or Disabling Bluetooth Features for Your Headset**

By default, all compatible Bluetooth features are enabled when you pair your headset. You can enable or disable certain features.

- 1 Select 🗘 > Wireless Networks > Bluetooth.
- 2 Select the headset name, and select .
- 3 Select an option:
  - · To disconnect the headset, select Disconnect.
  - · To disable audio from phone calls, select Phone calls.
  - To disable audio from streaming media, select **Media Audio**.

# Disconnecting a Bluetooth Device

You can temporarily disconnect a Bluetooth device without deleting it from the paired devices list. The Bluetooth device can connect to your Tread device automatically in the future.

- 1 Select **☼** > Wireless Networks > Bluetooth.
- 2 Select the device to disconnect.
- 3 Select Disconnect.

# **Deleting a Paired Phone**

You can delete a paired phone to prevent it from automatically connecting to your device in the future.

- 1 Select > Wireless Networks > Bluetooth.
- 2 Select the phone, and select Forget.

# **Street Navigation**

# Starting a Route

- 1 Select Where To, and search for a location.
- 2 Select a location.
- 3 Select an option:
  - To start navigating using the recommended route, select Go!.
  - To choose an alternate route, select \( \bar{Y} \), and select a route.
     Alternate routes appear to the right of the map.
  - To edit the course of the route, select  $\checkmark$  > Edit Route, and add shaping points to the route (Shaping Your Route, page 41).

The device calculates a route to the location and guides you using voice prompts and information on the map (*Your Route on the Map*, page 39). A preview of the major roads in your route appears at the edge of the map for several seconds.

If you need to stop at additional destinations, you can add the locations to your route (Adding a Location to Your Route, page 41).

## Starting a Route by Using the Map

You can start a route by selecting a location from the map.

- 1 Select View Map.
- 2 Drag and zoom the map to display the area to search.
- 3 Select a location on the map.
- 4 Select Go!.

# Your Route on the Map

As you travel, the device guides you to your destination using voice prompts and information on the map. Instructions for your next turn or exit, or other actions appear across the top of the map.



- Next action in the route. Indicates the next turn, exit, or other action and the lane in which you should travel, if available.
- 2 Distance to the next action.
- 3 Name of the street or exit associated with the next action.
- Route highlighted on the map.
- (5) Next action in the route. Arrows on the map indicate the location of upcoming actions.
- 6 Vehicle speed.
- 7 Name of the road on which you are traveling.
- 8 Estimated arrival time.

  TIP: You can touch this field to change the information it shows.
- (9) Map tools. Provides tools to show you more information about your route and surroundings.
- Map layers. Allows you to change the map orientation and add topographic and BirdsEye imagery to your map view.

#### **Active Lane Guidance**

As you approach some turns, exits, or interchanges in your route, a detailed simulation of the road appears beside the map, if available. A colored line 1 indicates the proper lane for the turn.



## **Viewing Turns and Directions**

While navigating a route, you can view upcoming turns, lane changes, or other directions for your route.

- 1 From the map, select an option:
  - To view upcoming turns and directions as you navigate, select > Turns.
     The map tool displays the next several turns or directions beside the map. The list updates automatically as you navigate the route.
  - To view the complete list of turns and directions for the entire route, select the text bar at the top of the map.
- 2 Select a turn or direction (optional).
  Detailed information appears. An image of the junction may appear for junctions on major roadways, if available.

### Viewing the Entire Route on the Map

- 1 While navigating a route, select anywhere on the map.
- 2 Select A.

# **Changing Your Active Route**

## Adding a Location to Your Route

Before you can add a location to your route, you must be navigating a route (Starting a Route, page 38).

You can add locations to the middle or end of your route. For example, you can add a fuel station as the next destination in your route.

**TIP:** To create complex routes with multiple destinations or scheduled stops, you can use the route planner to plan, schedule, and save a route (*Planning a Route*, page 24).

- 1 From the map, select **< > Where To**.
- 2 Search for a location.
- Select a location.
- 4 Select Go!.
- 5 Select an option:
  - · To add the location as the next destination in your route, select Add as Next Stop.
  - To add the location to the end of your route, select Add as Last Stop.
  - To add the location and edit the order of destinations in your route, select Add to Active Route.

The device re-calculates the route to include the added location and guides you to the destinations in order.

## **Shaping Your Route**

Before you can shape your route, you must start a route (Starting a Route, page 38).

You can manually shape your route to change its course. This allows you to direct the route to use a certain road or go through a certain area without adding a destination to the route.

- 1 Touch anywhere on the map.
- 2 Select Shape Route.

**TIP:** You can select **+** to zoom in on the map and select a more precise location.

The device enters route shaping mode and recalculates the route to travel through the selected location.

- 3 Select Go!.
- 4 If necessary, select an option:
  - To add more shaping points to the route, select additional locations on the map.
  - To remove a shaping point, select the shaping point and select Remove.

# Avoiding Delays, Tolls, and Areas

## **Avoiding Traffic Delays on Your Route**

Before you can avoid traffic delays, you must be receiving traffic information.

By default, the device optimizes your route to avoid traffic delays automatically. If you have disabled this option in the traffic settings (*Traffic Settings*, page 55), you can view and avoid traffic delays manually.

- 1 While navigating a route, select = > Traffic.
- 2 Select Alternate Route, if available.
- 3 Select Go!.

#### **Avoiding Toll Roads**

Your device can avoid routing you through areas that require tolls, such as toll roads, toll bridges, or congestion areas. The device may still include a toll area in your route if no other reasonable routes are available.

- 1 Select **A** > Navigation > Avoidances > Toll Roads.
- 2 Select Save.

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## **Avoiding Toll Stickers**

If the map data on your device contains detailed toll sticker information, you can avoid or allow roads that require toll stickers for each country.

**NOTE:** This feature is not available in all areas.

- 1 Select > Navigation > Tolls and Fees > Toll Stickers.
- 2 Select a country.
- 3 Select an option:
  - · To be asked each time before routing through an area that requires toll stickers, select Always Ask.
  - · To always avoid roads that require toll stickers, select Avoid.
  - · To always allow roads that require toll stickers, select **Allow**.

## **Avoiding Road Features**

- 1 Select 🌣 > Navigation > Avoidances.
- 2 Select the road features to avoid on your routes, and select Save.

#### **Custom Avoidances**

Custom avoidances allow you to select specific areas or sections of road to avoid. When the device calculates a route, it avoids these areas and roads unless no other reasonable route is available.

### **Avoiding a Road**

- 1 Select 🗘 > Navigation > Custom Avoidances.
- 2 If necessary, select Add Avoidance.
- 3 Select Add Avoid Road.
- 4 Select the starting point of the section of road to avoid, and select Next.
- 5 Select the ending point of the road section, and select Next.
- 6 Select Done.

### **Avoiding an Area**

- 1 Select 🌣 > Navigation > Custom Avoidances.
- 2 If necessary, select Add Avoidance.
- 3 Select Add Avoid Area.
- 4 Select the upper-left corner of the area to avoid, and select Next.
- 5 Select the lower-right corner of the area to avoid, and select Next. The selected area is shaded on the map.
- 6 Select Done.

#### **Disabling a Custom Avoidance**

You can disable a custom avoidance without deleting it.

- 1 Select 🗘 > Navigation > Custom Avoidances.
- 2 Select an avoidance.
- 3 Select = > Disable.

## **Deleting Custom Avoidances**

- 1 Select ❖ > Navigation > Custom Avoidances > 🗓.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To delete all custom avoidances, select Select All > Delete.
  - To delete one custom avoidance, select the avoidance, and select **Delete**.

## **Arriving at Your Destination**

When you approach your destination, the device provides information to help you complete your route.

- Implicates the location of your destination on the map, and a voice prompt announces you are approaching your destination.
- When you approach some destinations, the device automatically suggests parking areas. You can select More to view a full list of suggested parking areas (*Parking Near Your Destination*, page 44).
- When you stop at your destination, the device automatically ends the route. If the device does not detect your arrival automatically, you can select = > Stop to end your route.

# **Changing the Route Calculation Mode**

- 1 Select 🌣 > Navigation > Calculation Mode.
- 2 Select an option:
  - Select **Turn-by-Turn** to calculate routes on streets that are faster to drive but can be longer in distance.
  - Select Straight Line to calculate off-road, point-to-point routes in a straight line.

# Taking a Route Using Garmin Adventurous Routing™

Your device can calculate adventurous routes that prefer curvy roads, hills, and fewer highways. This feature can provide a more enjoyable ride, but it may increase the time or distance to your destination. The Garmin Adventurous Routing feature is not compatible with off-road trails.

**NOTE:** This feature is not available on all device models or for all map regions.

- 1 Select Where To > Categories.
- 2 If necessary, select a subcategory.
- 3 Select a location.
- 4 Select AS.
- 5 Use the slider to increase or decrease the level of adventure of your route.
- 6 Select Go!

# Taking a Detour

You can take a detour for a specified distance along your route or detour around specific roads. This is useful if you encounter construction zones, closed roads, or poor road conditions.

- 1 From the map, select = > Edit Route.
- 2 Select an option:
  - To detour your route for a specific distance, select **Detour by Distance**.
  - To detour around a specific road on the route, select **Detour by Road**.

# **Going Home**

The first time you start a route home, the device prompts you to enter your home location.

- 1 Select Where To > Go Home.
- 2 If necessary, enter your home location.

## **Editing Your Home Location**

- 1 Select Where To > = > Set Home Location.
- 2 Enter your home location.

# **Parking Near Your Destination**

Your device can help you find a parking spot near your destination. When you approach some destinations, the device automatically prompts you to search for parking.

- 1 Select an option:
  - · When the device prompts you, select Yes to search for nearby parking.
  - If the device does not prompt you, select Where To > Categories > Parking, and select ♥ > My Destination.
- 2 Select a parking location, and select Go! > Add as Next Stop.

The device guides you to the parking area.

### **Traffic**

#### **NOTICE**

Garmin is not responsible for the accuracy or timeliness of the traffic information.

Your device can provide information about traffic on the road ahead or on your route. You can set your device to avoid traffic when calculating routes, and to find a new route to your destination if a large traffic delay occurs on your active route (*Traffic Settings*, page 55). The traffic map allows you to browse the map for traffic delays in your area.

To provide traffic information, your device must be receiving traffic data.

• All product models can receive subscription-free traffic data using the Tread app.

Traffic data is not available in all areas. For information about traffic coverage areas, go to garmin.com/traffic.

## **Receiving Traffic Data Using Your Smartphone**

Your device can receive subscription-free traffic data while connected to a smartphone running the Tread app.

- 1 Connect your device to the Tread app (Pairing with Your Smartphone, page 34).
- 2 On your Tread Overland Edition device, select 🌣 > Traffic, and verify the Traffic option is selected.

# Viewing Traffic on the Map

The traffic map shows color-coded traffic flow and delays on nearby roads.

- 1 From the main menu, select -> Navigation > Traffic.
- 2 If necessary, select = > **Legend** to view the legend for the traffic map.

## **Searching for Traffic Incidents**

- 1 From the main menu, select > Navigation > Traffic.
- 2 Select = > Incidents.
- 3 Select an item in the list.
- 4 If there is more than one incident, use the arrows to view additional incidents.

# **Finding and Saving Locations**

The maps loaded in your device contain locations, such as restaurants, hotels, auto services, and detailed street information. The Where To menu helps you find your destination by providing several methods to browse, search, and save this information.

From the main menu, select Where To.

- To quickly search all locations on your device, select **QSearch** (Finding a Location Using the Search Bar, page 45).
- · To find an address, select Address.
- To browse or search pre-loaded points of interest by category, select **Categories** (*Finding a Location by Category*, page 47).
- To search near a different city or area, select 
   • next to the current search area (Changing the Search Area, page 46).
- To view and edit your saved locations, select **Waypoints** (Saving Locations, page 51).
- To view locations you have recently selected from the search results, select **Recent** (*Viewing Recently Found Locations*, page 50).
- To search for RV parks and campgrounds, select **Ultimate Public Campgrounds** (Finding Ultimate Campgrounds Points of Interest, page 48).
- To browse and search Tripadvisor® traveler ratings, select **Tripadvisor** (*Finding Tripadvisor Points of Interest*, page 49).
- To find national parks and explore park maps, select National Parks (Finding National Parks, page 48).
- To navigate to specific geographic coordinates, select **Coordinates** (*Finding a Location Using Coordinates*, page 50).




You can use the search bar to search for locations by entering a category, brand name, address, or city name.

- 1 Select Where To.
- 2 Select **Search** in the search bar.
- **3** Enter all or part of the search term.
  - Suggested search terms appear below the search bar.
- 4 Select an option:
  - To search for a type of business, enter a category name (for example, "movie theaters").
  - To search for a business name, enter all or part of the name.
  - To search for an address near you, enter the house number and street name.
  - To search for an address in another city, enter the house number, street name, city, and state.
  - · To search for a city, enter the city and state.
  - To search for coordinates, enter latitude and longitude coordinates.
- 5 Select an option:
  - To search using a suggested search term, select the term.
  - To search using the text you entered, select Q.
- 6 If necessary, select a location.

## **Location Search Results**

The location search results appear in a list, with the nearest location at the top. Each numbered location also appears on the map. You can scroll down to view more results.





# **Changing the Search Area**

By default, the device searches near your current location. You can also search other areas, such as near your destination, near another city, or along your active route.

- 1 Select Where To.
- 2 Select ♥.
- 3 Select an option.

# Finding a Location by Category

- 1 Select Where To.
- 2 Select a category, or select Categories.
- 3 If necessary, select a subcategory.
- 4 Select a location.

# Navigating to Points of Interest Within a Venue

NOTE: This feature may not be available in all areas or for all product models.

You can create a route to a point of interest (POI) within a larger venue, such as a store in a shopping mall or a specific terminal in an airport.

- 1 Select Where To > Search.
- **2** Enter the name of the venue, and select **Q**.
- 3 Select the venue.
  - A list of categories for POIs within the venue appears.
- 4 Select a category, select a location, and select Go!.

The device creates a route to the parking area or venue entrance closest to the POI. When you arrive at the destination, a checkered flag indicates the recommended parking area. A labeled point indicates the location of the POI within the venue.

### **Points of Interest**

#### NOTICE

You are responsible for understanding and complying with any applicable rules, laws, or regulations associated with points of interest.

A point of interest is a place that you may find useful or interesting. Points of interest are organized by category and can include popular travel destinations such as gas stations, restaurants, hotels, and entertainment venues.

### **Viewing Your Garmin Explore Waypoints**

- 1 Select > Adventure > Explore.
- 2 Select a data type.
- 3 Select an item to view the details.

#### **Synchronizing Garmin Explore Account Data**

Before you can synchronize account data, you must connect to the Tread app and enable Garmin Explore.

You can synchronize data, such as tracks, with your Garmin Explore account. This can be helpful to keep your data available on each of your compatible devices. Your device periodically synchronizes data with your account automatically. You can also synchronize data manually at any time.

- 1 Select > Adventure > Explore.
- 2 Select 🗞

## **Finding National Parks**

Device models that include maps for North America or the United States also include detailed information for national parks in the United States. You can navigate to a national park or to a location within a national park.

  - · To start navigating to the park, select Go!.
  - To view more park information or explore the park features and amenities, select 1.
  - To quickly find a location within the park, select a category from the list below the park name, and select a location.

### **Finding Campgrounds**

#### **NOTICE**

You are responsible for understanding and complying with any applicable rules, laws, or regulations associated with campgrounds.

Select Where To > Ultimate Public Campgrounds.

# **Finding Ultimate Campgrounds Points of Interest**

NOTE: This feature is not available in all areas.

#### **NOTICE**

You are responsible for understanding and complying with any applicable rules, laws, or regulations associated with campsites and points of interest.

Your device includes Ultimate Campgrounds points of interest, which allow you to find public campgrounds near your location.

- 3 Select a location.

### **Finding RV Parks**

NOTE: This feature is not available in all areas.

Select Where To > PlanRV Parks.

You can find nearby locations that offer repair, towing, and other services for RVs.

**Speed limit exceeded**: The device plays a tone and displays a red border on the speed limit icon when you exceed the posted speed limit for the current road.

Map updates provide the newest available changes to roads and locations in the maps used by your device. Keeping maps up to date helps your device find recently added locations and calculate more accurate routes. Map updates are large and may take several hours to complete.

Software updates provide changes and improvements to the device features and operation. Software updates are small and take a few minutes to complete.

You can update your device using two methods.

- You can connect the device to a Wi-Fi network to update directly on the device (recommended). This option allows you to update your device conveniently without connecting it to a computer.
- You can connect the device to a computer and update it using the Garmin Express<sup>™</sup> application (garmin.com /express).

## Updating Maps and Software Using a Wi-Fi Network

#### **NOTICE**

Map and software updates may require the device to download large files. Regular data limits or charges from your internet service provider apply. Contact your internet service provider for more information about data limits or charges.

You can update the maps and software by connecting your device to a Wi-Fi network that provides access to the internet. This allows you to keep your device up to date without connecting it to a computer.

- 1 Using the included USB cable, connect the device to external power.
  - **NOTE:** A USB power adapter is not included. Go to the product page on garmin.com to purchase a power adapter accessory.
- 2 Connect the device to a Wi-Fi network (Connecting to a Wireless Network, page 54).
  - While connected to a Wi-Fi network, the device checks for available updates automatically and displays a notification when an update is available.
- 3 Select an option:
  - When an update notification appears, swipe down from the top of the screen, and select An update is
    available..
  - To manually check for updates, select > Tools > System Updates.

The device displays available map and software updates. When an update is available, **Update Available** appears below Map or Software.

- 4 Select an option:
  - To install all available updates, select **Download**.
  - To install only map updates, select Map.
  - To install only software updates, select Software.
- 5 If necessary, read the license agreements, and select Accept All to accept the agreements.
  - **NOTE:** If you do not agree with the license terms, you can select Reject. This stops the update process. You cannot install updates until you accept the license agreements.
- **6** Keep the device connected to external power and within range of the Wi-Fi network until the update process is complete.

**NOTE:** If a map update is interrupted or canceled before it completes, your device may be missing map data. To repair missing map data, you must update the maps again.

- 5 In the Garmin Express application, click Add a Device.

  Pulling the device straight toward you may cause the mount to release from the suction cup.

- Verify the location services feature is enabled (Enabling or Disabling Location Services, page 56).
- · Take your device out of parking garages and away from tall buildings and trees.
- · Remain stationary for several minutes.

# My battery does not stay charged for very long

- Decrease the screen brightness (Display Settings, page 55).
- · Shorten the display timeout (Display Settings, page 55).
- Decrease the volume (Adjusting Sound and Notification Volume, page 55).
- Turn off the wi-fi radio when it is not in use (Connecting to a Wireless Network, page 54).
- Put the device in power saving mode when not in use (*Turning the Device On or Off*, page 3).
- · Keep your device away from extreme temperatures.
- · Do not leave your device in direct sunlight.

# My device does not connect to my phone

- Select > Wireless Networks > Bluetooth.
  - The Bluetooth option must be enabled.
- Enable Bluetooth wireless technology on your phone and bring your phone within 10 m (33 ft.) of the device.
- · Verify your phone is compatible.
  - Go to www.garmin.com/bluetooth for more information.
- · Complete the pairing process again.

To repeat the pairing process, you must unpair your phone and device (*Disconnecting a Bluetooth Device*, page 38), and complete the pairing process (*Pairing with Your Smartphone*, page 34).

# My device does not appear as a removable drive on my computer

On most computers, the device connects using Media Transfer Protocol (MTP). In MTP mode, the device appears as a portable device and not as a removable drive.

### **Garmin PowerSwitch**

Garmin strongly recommends having an experienced installer with the proper knowledge of electrical systems install the device. Incorrectly wiring the power cable can result in damage to the vehicle or the battery and can cause bodily injury.

You can use a connected Garmin PowerSwitch device to control lights, fans, and more from your Tread - Overland Edition device.

## **Mounting Considerations**

- The device must be mounted close to the battery and within the range of the supplied power cable.
- The mounting surface must be strong enough to support the weight of the device.
- The location must allow room for the routing and connection of all cables.

## **Mounting the Device**

Before you can mount the device, you must select a mounting location and purchase the appropriate hardware for your mounting surface.

#### NOTICE

Avoid wires, gauges, air bags, air bag covers, HVAC, and other items when drilling pilot holes and attaching the mount to the vehicle. Garmin is not responsible for any damages or consequences arising from the installation.

1 Place the mount on the selected location.



- 2 Using the mount as a template, mark the two screw locations ①.
- 3 Drill pilot holes (optional).
  For some types of mounting material, drilling pilot holes is necessary. Do not drill through the mount.
- 4 Securely fasten the mount to the surface using the appropriate hardware for your mounting surface.

# **Opening the Front Cover**

You must open the front cover to make electrical connections.

1 Lift the front cover latch 1 and rotate it counter-clockwise.



Do not connect a power source to an accessory output terminal. Failure to follow this notice could cause damage to your vehicle or your device.

#### Accessory requirements:

- Verify the amperage rating of each accessory before wiring it to the Garmin PowerSwitch device. The device supports accessories up to 30 A for each channel and a maximum of 100 A for the entire system.
- Use 10 AWG (6 mm<sup>2</sup>) wires for accessories that use 20 to 30 A.
- Use 12 AWG (4 mm<sup>2</sup>) wires for accessories that use 10 to 20 A.
- Use 14 AWG (2.5 mm<sup>2</sup>) wires for accessories that use less than 10 A.
- Use the appropriate size terminals for all accessory connections.
- · Crimp all terminal connectors securely.
- 1 Connect the positive wire from the accessory 1 to one of the accessory terminals 2 on the Garmin PowerSwitch device.



2 Connect the negative or ground wire ③ to an unpainted ground stud ④ on the vehicle frame, to a ground distribution block, or directly to the negative terminal on the battery.

#### **↑** CAUTION

Do not connect the accessory ground wires to the ground terminal (GND) on the Garmin PowerSwitch device, as doing so could result in personal injury or property damage, or could negatively impact device functionality.

3 Verify that all electrical connections are tight and will not come loose during use.

### **Connecting a Control Input**

You can connect to the control terminals to enable the Garmin PowerSwitch device to turn on customizable outputs. For example, you can connect your vehicle ignition switch to a control input terminal to turn on accessories automatically each time you start your vehicle. The control terminals detect a signal from 3.3 V to 18 V. You can configure output functions with the Garmin PowerSwitch app.


Connect the control wire from the control source in your vehicle to one of the two control terminals on the Garmin PowerSwitch device.

## **Connecting the Device to Vehicle Power**

Before you can connect the device to vehicle power, you must remove the warning tag from the +12V terminal on the device.

You should always confirm all electrical connections are secure and will not come loose while operating the device.

1 Connect the large ring end of the included ground wire 1 to the negative terminal on the vehicle battery.



- 2 Connect the small ring end of the ground wire to the **GND** terminal ② on the device.
- 3 Connect the small ring end of the included 12V cable to the +12V terminal 3 on the device.
- 4 Tighten the  $\frac{3}{8}$  in. nut on the +12V terminal to a maximum torque specification of 4.52 N-m (40 lbf-in.). You should confirm the nut cannot be loosened by hand.

#### **NOTICE**

Do not overtighten the +12V terminal to prevent damage to the terminal.

5 Connect the large ring end of the 12V cable 4 to the positive terminal on the vehicle battery.

### Pairing with a Garmin Navigation Device

You can pair your Garmin PowerSwitch device with a compatible Garmin navigation device.

- 1 Turn on power to your Garmin PowerSwitch device, and place your compatible Garmin navigation device within 1 m (3.3 ft.) of it.

The main app dashboard appears. After the devices are paired, they connect automatically when they are turned on and within range.

## **Troubleshooting**

## My Garmin PowerSwitch will not stay connected

- · Verify the Garmin PowerSwitch device is receiving power.
- · Verify that Bluetooth technology is enabled on your paired navigation device or smartphone.
- · Move the navigation device or smartphone closer to your Garmin PowerSwitch device.
- Verify that your vehicle's battery is supplying at least 12 V of power.

The Garmin PowerSwitch device turns off all outputs automatically to preserve your vehicle's battery if it is receiving less than 11 V of power (*My accessories are not receiving power*, page 65).

#### My accessories are not receiving power

  - If the device detects a system load of more than 100 A, it turns off all outputs automatically.
- · Inspect all electrical connections for an electrical short circuit.

#### Mounting the Tread Audio Box Black Box Device


Before you mount the device, you must select a mounting location, and determine what screws and other mounting hardware are needed for the surface.

- 1 Place the black box device in the mounting location, and mark the location of the pilot holes.
- 2 Drill a pilot hole for one corner of the device.
- 3 Loosely fasten the device to the mounting surface with one corner, and examine the other three pilot-hole marks.
- 4 Mark new pilot-hole locations if necessary, and remove the device from the mounting surface.
- **5** Drill the remaining pilot holes.
- **6** Secure the device to the mounting location.

#### Connections

The stereo must be connected to power, to speakers, and to media input sources to function correctly. You should carefully plan the layout of the stereo, speakers, and your input sources before making any connections.







1 Remove the terminal cover 1 using a Phillips screwdriver.



- 2 Remove the screws from the GND terminal and the +12V terminal 2.
- 3 Connect the large ring end of the included ground wire 3 to the negative terminal on the vehicle battery.



- 4 Connect the small ring end of the ground wire to the **GND** terminal **4** on the device.
- Tighten the screw on the GND terminal.You should confirm the screws cannot be loosened by hand.
- 6 Connect the small ring end of the included 12V cable to the **+12V** terminal **(5)** on the device.
- 7 Tighten the screw on the +12V terminal.You should confirm the screws cannot be loosened by hand.

#### NOTICE

Do not overtighten the screw on the +12V terminal to prevent damage to the terminal.

- 8 Connect the large ring end of the 12V cable 6 to the positive terminal on the vehicle battery.
- 9 Replace and tighten the terminal cover on the device.


## **Using the Heat-Shrink Crimp Connectors**

You should use the included heat-shrink crimp connectors to make a water-tight connection between the bare wires.

#### **⚠ WARNING**

Only use the heat gun to apply heat to the heat-shrink crimp connectors in a well-ventilated area. Do not use the heat gun near clothing or bare skin. Doing so can result in property damage or serious injury.

- 1 Using wire strippers, strip 6 mm ( $^{1}/_{4}$  in.) off the end of each bare wire.
- 2 If necessary, twist the strands of each wire 1 clockwise to bundle them together.




- 3 Insert one bare wire into one end of the heat-shrink crimp connector ②. The bare wires are not secure until they are crimped and sealed.
- 4 Insert the corresponding bare wire into the other end of the heat-shrink crimp connector.
- **5** Using pliers, crimp both sides of the center of the connector ③ to secure the connection.
- **6** Using a heat gun, apply heat to the heat-shrink crimp connector until the connector is sealed to the wires. Do not apply heat to the wires directly.

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#### **Complete System Wiring**

This diagram illustrates a system installation with an external amplifier and subwoofer connected to the stereo using a line out.

**NOTE:** You can also connect speakers to the speaker wires for the internal stereo amplifier while using an external amplifier connected to the line out. Adjusting the volume affects speakers connected to the internal amplifier and speakers connected to the line out. This may result in uneven volume levels.


#### **Speaker Zones**

## **Wireless Remote Mounting Considerations**

#### NOTICE

Selecting the correct mounting location is critical to optimize the performance of the wireless remote.

- You must mount the wireless remote in a location that is within 10 m (33 ft.) of the stereo.
- · You must mount the wireless remote in a location where it is not submerged.
- You should select a flat mounting surface for the best results.
- The mounting surface must be free of dirt, debris, wax, or coatings.
- Move away from sources that can interfere with the wireless remote's operation. Sources of interference
  may include strong electromagnetic fields, some 2.4 GHz wireless sensors, high-voltage power lines, electric
  motors, and wireless LAN access points.
- You should install the wireless remote in a location where you can allow the adhesive to dry at room temperature for 72 hours.

#### **Mounting the Wireless Remote**

- 1 Select an appropriate location for the remote control (Wireless Remote Mounting Considerations, page 73).
- 2 Test the range at the selected location by holding the wireless remote at the location, pressing a few buttons, and confirming the correct operation.
- **3** Thoroughly clean and dry the mounting surface using a mixture of water and isopropyl alcohol. The mounting surface must be free of dirt, debris, wax, or coatings.
- 4 Place the wireless remote on the mount, and rotate the remote until you hear a click.
- **5** Remove the backing from the adhesive.
- 6 Carefully orient the wireless remote in the mount with the Fusion® logo at the bottom.

#### NOTICE

It is extremely difficult to remove the adhesive. Some mounting surfaces might be damaged after removing the adhesive.

7 Press the wireless remote in the mount firmly onto the mounting surface, maintaining pressure for at least 60 seconds.

### **Mounting the Speakers and Brackets**

You can mount the Tread 6.5" XS-LED Tower Speakers to a roll bar using the included brackets.

When installing the speaker and bracket, you can route the speaker and LED cable along the roll bar.

- 1 If necessary, mark the locations on the roll bar where you plan to mount the speakers.
- 2 Route the speaker and LED power wires along the roll bar to the mounting locations.
- 3 Feed the cable 1 from the speaker through the base of the bracket 2.



- 4 Place the base of the bracket over the mounting knob on the speaker 3.
- 5 Using a 4 mm hex driver or hex key, attach the collar 4 to the base of the bracket using the two shorter screws and washers 5, but do not fully tighten them.
- **6** Connect the speaker and LED wires (*Wiring*, page 75).
- 7 Place the connected wires in the channel on the base of the bracket 6, and route the wires along the roll bar.



- 8 Place the top of the bracket 7 over the roll bar, and hold it against the base of the bracket.
- 9 Using a 5 mm hex driver or hex key, attach the top of the bracket to the base of the bracket using the two longer screws and washers (8), but do not fully tighten them.

- **10** Adjust the angle of the speakers, and tighten all of the screws to secure the speaker to the roll bar, observing these maximum torque measurements:
  - For the longer screws that secure the bracket to the roll bar (8), do not tighten to more than 4 N-m (2.95 lbf-ft.).
  - For the shorter screws that secure the bracket to the speaker (5), do not tighten to more than 2.5 N-m (1.84 lbf-ft.).

#### NOTICE

Tightening the screws more than the specified maximum torque measurement can damage the bracket.

- 11 Repeat these steps for additional brackets.
- **12** Route the speaker and LED wires along a suitable path in your vehicle, and secure them using the included zip ties.

#### Wiring

When connecting the speakers and LED lights to your stereo or amplifier, observe these considerations.

- You should use the included wire to connect the speakers to the stereo or amplifier. If necessary, you can use a larger gauge of wire (*Wire Gauge Guide*, page 75).
- You should make all of the wiring connections using the included heat-shrink crimp connectors. You should plan and select the best connection type for your installation needs.
- You can use this table to identify the polarity of the leads on the speaker.

#### Wire Gauge Guide

If necessary, you can use longer cables for your installation.

**NOTE:** If you are using aluminum or tinned wire, you should use a wire two gauges larger than the gauge listed below to compensate for a potential voltage drop due to the wire material.

- Use 16 AWG (1.31 mm<sup>2</sup>) for speaker wires.
- Use 20 AWG (0.52 mm<sup>2</sup>) for LED wires.

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


